

London's theater scene is concentrated around the prestigious West End, which occupies the area between The Strand to the south and Oxford Street to the north. Within these narrow confines, you'll find a collection of late Victorian and Edwardian stages hosting a range of impressive productions, from high-profile musicals to star-studded plays.

But out in London's other boroughs, there is another theater scene that's thriving. One that features newer writers on the cusp of success and experimental productions in their debut runs. Take a chance on one of these more intimate venues and you might just catch the next big thing before it reaches the West End.

Wellclose Square, London E1, UK 020 7702 2789

Hidden away down an East End alley, this beautiful theater began its life as an 18th-century alehouse, before the stunning music hall was added in the 19th century. In the following decades, it served as a Methodist mission and by the time the 1960s rolled around, it was destined for demolition. It survived destruction, but not dereliction and fell into decline in the late 20th century. Since then, Wilton's has slowly but surely been brought back to life. It continues to host a variety of performances and events in its gorgeous high-ceilinged hall, which still has original period features.

This grand turn-of-the-century theater was state of the art when it first opened, equipped with electric lights, central heating and an in-built projection box. Apart from hosting plays, concerts and variety shows, it has also functioned as a TV studio and a bingo hall. After undergoing extensive restoration in the early 2000s, the glorious building, with its gilt cherubs, domes and ornate décor, is now in tip-top shape. Its Christmas pantomime is rated among London's best.

BEFORE YOU GO

I. WHAT TO TAKE

Your tickets and an open mind.

Most venues have a bar, so bring some cash for drinks or pre-theater snacks.

VI. Local Notes

Tickets for shows at these venues are generally cheaper than West End shows, however — due to limited space and high demand — they can often sell out, so it's best to purchase tickets well in advance.
