

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Despite environmental regulations, Australia's indigenous wildlife population has been blighted by both climate change and invasive species. Provide hands-on assistance to rangers and conservation staff at a Gold Coast wildlife park and care for endemic creatures such as koalas and kangaroos. We'll also help with other projects around the park, improving infrastructure and ensuring the homes of these animals are kept clean.

My children were amazed not only by the wildlife, but by the different sides of Australia we saw. Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

After we settle into our hotel, receive a traditional Aboriginal welcome to the Gold Coast with a dance performance and fire demonstration. Trek around the coastal headland known as Dreaming Mountain to discover sites used by the local Yugambeh people. Watch the sun set on a cruise through the Gold Coast waterways.

Day 3

Head to the local conservation park where we'll begin a variety of wild-life-related activities, including caring for the wallabies, koalas and kangaroos. Hike into the hinterland to the spectacular Currumbin Valley and view tumbling waterfalls in Springbrook National Park.

Day 4

We'll continue with our projects at the wildlife park and then head to a leading koala conservation center to find out more about the steps being taken to protect these gentle marsupials. Enjoy a barefoot stroll in the sand on the way back to the hotel, as we stop at a Gold Coast beach.

Day 5

Boosted by a greater understanding of the park's work and the animals it cares for, we'll begin to make a more tangible difference to the various conservation projects. Later, we'll cruise along the coast to the quaint seaside village of Brunswick Heads.

Day 6

After a final morning working at the

wildlife park, venture into the rainforest and scale a towering skyway, which meanders through the trees, while spotting some of the abundant wildlife perched in the canopy. After, explore the quaint galleries and wineries of Mount Tamborine.

Day 7

Hop aboard the ferry to North Stradbroke Island and enjoy a traditional Aboriginal welcome from the indigenous Quandamooka people. Paint your own boomerang, play a tune on a didgeridoo and visit the freshwater Myora Springs, before strolling through the bush towards the beach, spotting native koalas along the way.

Day 8


Soak up the beauty of North Stradbroke Island by hiking to the island's famous blowhole, keeping watch for kangaroos and dolphins along the way. Paddle in a kayak out into the waters off picturesque Amity Point and survey the incredible marine life present under the sea. That evening, try your hand at Australian lawn bowling.


Days 9 + 10

Return to the mainland and further explore the beaches of the Gold Coast, as well as shopping for some last-minute souvenirs. Reminisce about our experiences at a farewell dinner, before heading back to the airport to return home.

Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Find your bearings in the northern Thai city of Chiang Mai and learn about the cultural norms that prevail here. Tour the city and climb to the top of the ornate Buddhist temple of Wat Doi Suthep. Wander around and take in stunning views of the entire region. Visit the lush botanical gardens of Doi Pui and the community of the Hmong ethnic hill tribe.

Day 3

Volunteer at a local school that receives children from the city as well as the hill tribes. Teach basic English lessons and engage the pupils with a range of educational games and activities. Experience an explosion of local flavors at a Thai cooking course after

sourcing ingredients from an open-air fresh food market.

Day 4

Spend the morning at the school tutoring your students. After lunch, get better acquainted with the community by meeting the monks shaping modern-day Buddhism and venturing to local markets to taste delicacies and purchase crafts from artisans.

Days 5 + 6

Over the next two mornings continue tutoring at the school. In the afternoons, visit a home for exiled single mothers and learn first-hand about Thai massage. In the evenings, explore the famed night bazaar and enjoy independent exploration through the charming historic district.

Day 7


Venture to an Akha hill tribe village on the outskirts of Chiang Mai and learn about their fascinating traditions. Meet with village elders, practice traditional bamboo cutting and find out how they are preserving their heritage in the face of modernization.


Day 8

Journey to a sanctuary for elephants who were either being hunted or who were in unhealthy working conditions. Meet the elephants and visit the nursery, where newborn elephants are housed. You'll have the chance to interact with the elephants and bathe them while learning about these gentle giants from their caretakers.

Days 9 + 10

For our final day of volunteering, host an all-day English camp. Bid farewell to the students that we have worked alongside throughout the week and enjoy a final lunch together. Feast and reflect at a farewell dinner, before heading back to the airport the following day.







The elephant population of Thailand faces an uncertain future due to factors such as deforestation and illegal poaching. Volunteer alongside a team at a renowned elephant conservation sanctuary, which cares for animals that have been rescued. Feed these gentle giants, clean their living areas, maintain the sanctuary and watch them thrive in their natural habitat.

66 Working alongside these gentle giants **truly blew me and my family away**. I was amazed at the approach the community took toward their preservation and the commitment the locals have to their health and well-being. Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Explore the stunning southern Thai island of Phuket and learn more about the local traditions and culture. Visit a fishing village, discover ancient temples and search for souvenirs and crafts at the markets of colonial Phuket town.

Day 3

Board a boat bound for the offshore Yao Islands. We'll get a tour of the community from the locals and can begin to appreciate the laid-back way of life. Chat with fishermen, learn traditional batik painting and sample Thai cuisine, including fresh coconut juice and a home-cooked lunch at one of the islander's own homes.

Day 4

Visit an elephant sanctuary in the rainforest and walk through lush jungle in the company of one of these gentle giants. Find out more about the work being done to protect these remarkable creatures as we spend the day with the sanctuary's conservation team.

Days 5 + 6

Gather food and feed the elephants, as we begin our volunteering work at the sanctuary. Shadow the elephants and their caretakers to see how these great beasts thrive in the jungle. Clear paths, plant trees, clean pens and even take a few moments to relax in the treetop observation center.

Day 7

Watch the elephants reveling in their


natural habitat as they bathe, socialize, forage and roam free. Put the final touches to our work at the sanctuary.

Day 8

Ride the turquoise waters as we take a boat through the tropical Phi Phi Islands and arrive in paradise. Lay out on chalk-white sands and take in these stunning surroundings at our four-anda-half star luxury oceanfront base.

Days 9 + 10

Snorkel above offshore reefs, gaze across the peninsula or simply bask on the beach as we enjoy a free day on the famous island of Koh Phi Phi. Sit down for one final farewell dinner together before heading off to the airport the following morning.









The West Indian manatee population is under threat due to habitat loss, boat strikes and human impact in the waters of Belize. Volunteer with a manatee conservation group to collect critical data on these creatures, including currents, size of populations and overall health, which will be used to better understand these aquatic mammals. Explore ocean, river and lagoon ecosystems to track both manatees and other marine life, including dolphins.

Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

After arriving, you'll have the chance to meet Belizean primates as we stop at a baboon sanctuary en route to the golden sandy beaches of Hopkins. The next day we'll visit the Nim Li Punit Maya ruins, before sampling traditional foods, playing instruments and making tortillas at the home of a local family. Watch the sun set in the seaside town of Punta Gorda.

Day 3

Hop aboard a kayak to explore the local marine ecosystem and learn about the issues facing the manatees of Belize from the conservation experts we'll be working alongside. After lunch, we'll board a boat, which will take us through Payne's Creek National Park to our mangrove-surrounded accommodation.

Day 4

Rise and shine for a first day monitoring the manatee population in a nearby lagoon, while also tracking other marine life, including dolphins. Return to the idyllic coastal village of Punta Negra and enjoy a coconut oilmaking workshop.

Day 5

Head out to the sugar-sand beaches of the coral-edged island of West Snake Caye after spending the morning collecting data on manatees along the beautiful Frenchman Cayes. Picnic on the beach and snorkel in the crystal-clear waters.

Day 6

Meander along the river for a final day helping to expand knowledge of the manatee population. Explore the quaint Caribbean town of Punta Gorda and enjoy a dinner together at one of the town's restaurants.

Days 7 + 8

Venture into hidden caves camouflaged by jungle growth, explore beautiful waterfalls and relax by natural pools, as we visit Rio Blanco National Park. Spend a final evening at the Monkey Bay Wildlife Sanctuary, before embarking on a night tour of the Belize Zoo. Rise early to head back to Belize City for flights home.







Costa Rica's sea turtle population has declined by an astonishing 90 percent over the past 35 years due to a host of factors, including climate change, boat traffic and increasing amounts of trash in their habitats. We'll spend three days volunteering with a turtle conservation organization conducting night patrols, collecting eggs and aiding researchers. Because of nesting patterns, our time will be split over the course of the year between the Caribbean and Pacific coasts.

66 I loved watching my granddaughter's eyes light up as she released a baby turtle into its natural habitat. Every time she encountered a new species of animal that she had only previously seen in a zoo, I couldn't help but smile. My husband and I also really enjoyed our long walks on the beach. ?? - Rita Q.

Itinerary

Day 1 + 2

After a welcome dinner and a good night's sleep, we'll rise early and journey through scenic mountainous terrain toward the coast. We'll find our bearings at the beachside accommodation, learn about the conservation work and embark upon a midnight patrol to scope the nesting area.

Day 3

Protect turtles from discarded trash by spending a couple of hours on a beach clean-up, as well as other conservation projects. Return to work at the hatchery in the late afternoon and patrol the beach in shifts. During peak turtle nesting season, you may have the chance to release hatchlings into the ocean.

Day 4

Ride a boat through unspoiled jungle and look out for crocodiles, exotic birds and fish rummaging along the river bed. Hear from a Costa Rican conservationist on the challenges facing local wildlife and participate in our final night patrol.

Day 5 (Caribbean)

After driving to the small town of Siquirres in the heart of the Costa Rican rainforest, raft down a river that cuts through the jungle to reach our base lodge. Explore the nearby trails and waterfalls before dining together at the lodge restaurant nestled in the trees.

Day 5 (Pacific)

Relax on the beach after some maintenance work around the hatchery. Take an afternoon hike along the coastline.

Day 6 (Caribbean)

Swoop over the jungle canopy on zip lines, watching for wildlife as you go. Later, hike to a local waterfall or simply relax at the lodge and soak in the surrounding natural beauty.

Day 6 (Pacific)

Return to the Liberia region and visit an animal rescue center rehabilitating endangered wildlife including pumas, ocelots and jaguars. Continue on to a mountainside hacienda where we'll visit natural hot springs, a butterfly farm and a serpentarium.

Day 7 + **8** (Caribbean)

Brace yourselves for the thrills and spills of a morning rafting on local rapids. Under-12s can ride in a basket-pulley system over the river and take a horseback trip through the rainforest instead. Drive back to San Jose and enjoy a farewell dinner together, before departing the following day.

Day 7 + **8** (Pacific)

Careen over the treetops on a zip line and ride an inner tube down the Rio Negro during an action-packed penultimate day. Enjoy a final afternoon relaxing or exploring before reflecting on the trip at a farewell dinner.







Costa Rica has an excellent reputation as a leader in sustainability, but environmental pressures are rising due to a growing population and increased deforestation. Plant trees with a rural community in the highlands and learn about a traditional way of life. Volunteer at a wildlife rescue center, where the whole family will lend a hand helping injured creatures such as sloths, spider monkeys and marmosets.

66 My family has vacationed to Costa Rica before but **this trip was different**. Over the course of eight days, we not only saw volcanoes, rainforests and absolutely beautiful beaches, but were able to have our kids help out for a morning at a local wildlife rescue. Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Experience a traditional way of life in a rural community in the highland town of Fortuna. Local schoolchildren will entertain us with a dance presentation and we will also learn about the farming techniques of the region. Assist on a reforestation project and return to town to cook up one of Costa Rica's most famous dishes.

Day 3

Spend the morning learning about the cacao bean's role in Costa Rican history, as well as finding out how it is harvested and produced, before soaking in the natural hot springs at the base of Arenal Volcano. Begin to explore the vast cloud forest reserve of Monteverde.

Day 4

Hike along the hanging bridges that skirt the stunning rainforest canopy in one of the most biodiverse regions of Costa Rica. Spend the afternoon exploring the forest-encircled mountain town of Monteverde. After sunset, venture into the forest again for up-close encounters with nocturnal creatures.

Day 5

We'll hit the road heading to the fun surfing town of Quepos, stopping at the Tarcoles River on the way to spot crocodiles from the safety of a bridge. After arriving in Quepos, visit a wildlife rescue center and meet sloths, monkeys and toucans.

Day 6


Volunteer at a wildlife center dedicated to helping rescued animals and learn about the issues these vulnerable species face. Explore the stunning coastline, rugged rainforest and beaches of Manuel Antonio National Park, before returning to Quepos.

Days 7 + 8

Spend the morning hiking through Manuel Antonio National Park, looking for monkeys, sloths and all manner of birds. For those seeking a more intense adrenaline hit, there is the opportunity to add on an exhilarating rafting excursion along Class II rapids. Lounge on the park's pristine beaches before heading to San Jose the next morning to catch our flights back home.









Schools, medical clinics and houses are being constructed in the Dominican Republic out of reusable plastic bottles. We'll work with local people, including Haitian migrant communities, to create more of these structures, which help rid the area of waste and teach environmental awareness. Most importantly, they provide a much-needed resource, with many of these rural communities lacking basic infrastructure.

66 This was exactly what we wanted – an **up-close** and **personal experience of the real Dominican Republic**. Our guide Dave introduced us to really interesting community members, and the volunteer project gave us a way to become part of this village and get to know about the challenges people faced. Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Explore our base in the small town of Playa Las Canas and learn about the social, political and cultural issues affecting the Dominican Republic. Sample the local cuisine, wander around the markets and take a short stroll down to the beach to listen to the waves gently crashing against the shoreline.

Day 3

Roll your sleeves up and begin work on a variety of community projects, which will make a huge difference to the surrounding towns. Our work will revolve around boosting the use of recyclable materials and will include constructing schools and health clinics out of discarded plastic bottles.

Day 4

The hands-on learning experiences about the lives of local people continue today as we visit a Dominican batey, a community of displaced Haitians who have come to the north of the island seeking better economic opportunities.

Day 5


Explore the untouched side of the Dominican landscape after the volunteer work concludes for the day. with an afternoon free to lounge on the island's undeveloped beaches or breathlessly climb through the mountainous interior where we will uncover cool swimming holes and trails leading through dense jungle.

Day 6


After concluding our work in the community, you will have further chances to visit lesser-explored island locales. Climb to a rural mountain village to experience a traditional way of life or simply relax on the white-sand beaches. which are a hallmark of the Dominican Republic's north coast.

Days 7 + 8

Hop aboard a catamaran anchored at Sosua Beach and cruise toward hidden coves. Don snorkeling gear and plunge into the warm waters to view the colorful and wonderful marine creatures that populate this underwater paradise. There will be another opportunity to lounge on the beach, before a farewell dinner.









Guatemala's Maya community has long been discriminated against and faces the challenge of preserving its heritage in the face of rampant globalization. Support local Maya teachers who strive to preserve this culture for the next generation by developing learning materials and educational games for students. These resources will be left behind and used throughout the school in their future work.

Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Stroll the cobbled streets of the colonial town of Antigua as we learn about Guatemalan culture and cuisine. Meet with local Maya women, who will teach us the age-old customs involved in a traditional Maya wedding ceremony. Make tortillas and learn how the country's famed coffee is roasted, before heading to Quetzaltenango.

Day 3

Wake up to the mountain air of the Guatemalan highlands and begin the community work at a local school that promotes Maya heritage in the classroom. Meet with the school's director to learn more about the socioeconomic situation in the area.

Days 4 + 5

Spend two more days in the classroom developing educational materials to help the teachers; sharing your talents in arts, crafts and sports; and helping teach students basic English skills.


After school, there will be opportunities for extracurricular excursions, including a visit to an organic coffee plantation and a salsa dancing class. Get acquainted with Guatemala's tumultuous recent history during a lesson focusing on the country's civil war, which only ended in 1996. Meet a former guerrilla who is now a human rights advocate and hear a contrasting perspective on the conflict from an ex-military general.

Day 6


Lake Atitlan is regarded as one of the 10 most beautiful lakes in the world and is a sacred site for the Maya people. Spend the day enjoying the activities around the lake. Row to a village on the opposite bank and go for a scenic lakeside stroll.

Days 7 + 8

Shop for last-minute souvenirs at the Chichicastenango craft market, where skilled Maya artisans from across the country sell their carefully designed products. Return to Antigua for a final wander about town and a farewell dinner, before we say our goodbyes.









By the time the Galapagos National Park was established in the 1959, the islands' giant tortoise population had been decimated, with only 11 of the 14 original populations remaining. Volunteer at a tortoise sanctuary, helping remove invasive plant species and sowing native bushes and grasses that the tortoises eat. Learn first-hand about protecting the natural habitat of the Galapagos' most emblematic native species.

66 Traveling to the Galapagos as a family was truly a **bucket list item**. From the vast array wildlife to our guide's depth of knowledge to the time spent volunteering with the massive tortoises, **this is a trip our family will never forget**. Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Tour the cobblestone streets of Quito's UNESCO-listed colonial center, and see the city's more modern side. Ride a cable car to a mountain summit and enjoy a bird's-eye view of the city and surrounding volcanic peaks before dining at a chic restaurant.

Day 3

Catch an early flight to Baltra Island in the Galapagos and hop aboard a boat to Isabela Island. Spend the evening exploring the idyllic coastal town of Puerto Villamil, the third largest urban area in the archipelago.

Day 4

Snorkel at the spectacular site of Los Tuneles, off the coast of Isabela. Dive beneath the turquoise sea and explore gnarled formations of hardened lava, which have created underwater tunnels. Swim alongside sea turtles, rays and white-tipped sharks.

Day 5

Kayak around the Las Tintoreras islets in search of the famed blue-footed boobies and snorkel in quiet coves known to house turtles, friendly reef sharks and tropical fish. Wander through a pristine mangrove forest at low tide to discover an otherwise invisible ecosystem, before stopping at a tortoise breeding center to learn about the efforts to repopulate the islands.

Day 6

After a pre-dawn boat ride to Santa Cruz Island, we'll head to the highlands. Hike through underground tunnels formed by lava and see giant tortoises slowly plodding along. Volunteer at a sanctuary, planting native crops and removing invasive species to help restore the tortoises' habitat.

Day 7


Visit the Charles Darwin Research Station to learn about the conservation projects across the archipelago. Trek to the floury white sands of Tortuga Bay where you can visit marine iguanas, go swimming or simply soak up some sun. We'll then continue our work at the tortoise sanctuary in the highlands of Santa Cruz.

Day 8

Venture to the uninhabited island of North Seymour, home to one of the largest populations of blue-footed boobies and frigate birds, identifiable by their large, red balloon-like throat sacks. Learn about the symbiotic relationship between these two species, before we stop at a magnificent beach where you can snorkel with sea lions.

Days 9 + 10

Plunge into the protected waters around the island of Pinzon, one of the best snorkeling spots in the archipelago, and swim with sea turtles and sea lions. Cruise around the island of Daphne, which is only accessible to scientists. The following day, fly back to Quito, before continuing the journey home.







Education is key to unlocking economic doors in the deprived small towns on the outskirts of the Peruvian city of Cusco. Assist with an after-school program that helps local children improve their English language skills. Devise lessons and educational games, which will create lasting memories both for you and the children involved.

Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Settle into a Cusco guesthouse for the night, before rising to enjoy an authentic Peruvian breakfast the following day. Learn about the area's fascinating history and visit landmark sights, including the cathedral, San Blas church and the Inca Temple of the Sun, Koricancha.

Days 3 + 4 + 5

Head for a small Andean village outside Cusco and meet a mystic shaman who will explain ancient Inca spiritual rituals. We'll sew handmade dolls using colorful locally woven fabrics and tour a nearby orphanage. Teach basic English through language lessons and engaging educational games at the community's after-school program.

Days 6 + 7

Experience the innovative ways that a local artist and his wife are economically empowering women in the community through projects such as selling hand-sewn Peruvian dolls internationally. Visit the women's houses and learn to make a typical local dish, before continuing to assist with the after-school program.

Day 8

Head back to Cusco for a tour of the city that will include shopping at openair markets. Savor a farewell dinner before the two groups – those taking part in the 10-day and 14-day trips – go their separate ways.

Days 9 + 10 (10 Day)

Rattle through the Andes on a train to

reach the famous mountaintop ruins of Machu Picchu, where we will spend the afternoon reflecting on the astonishing archaeological masterpiece. Return to Cusco later in the afternoon before departing the next day.

Day 9 (14 Day)

Discover Inca remnants scattered around the Sacred Valley in Pukapukara, Qenqo and Tambomachay. Stop off at a llama farm along the way.

Day 10 (14 Day)

Sit back for a scenic drive to the historic village of Ollantaytambo, where you'll begin a 13,000-foot ascent overlooking the Wakay Willca glacier. Descend back down the pass to the Pacha Conservancy camp and hear about their environmental work. Travel to the town of Santa Teresa and bathe in the natural hot springs.

Days 11 + 12 (14 Day)

Hike along the river and railroad tracks, slowly descending into the rainforest until we eventually reach the town of Aguas Calientes, at the base of Machu Picchu. Venture inside the centuries-old Inca citadel the following day, before returning to Cusco.

Days 13 + 14 (14 Day)

Absorb the atmosphere of the Cusco streets, drinking coffee, listening to the church bells or picking up some final souvenirs, before a farewell dinner and flights home.







South Africa's largest animal reserve, Kruger National Park, faces threats from rhino poachers, leopard-shooting farmers and outbreaks of immune system viruses among its lion population. Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Wake up to the sound of singing birds in the heart of the African bush after heading straight to Kruger National Park, following arrival in Johannesburg. Learn how to track leopards and hyenas by identifying paw marks and set up camera traps to gather data about animal movements. We'll further introduce ourselves to this wilderness on a game drive.

Day 3

Enjoy an introduction to South African culture at a local community show then visit Moholoholo, a rehabilitative haven for abandoned, injured and poisoned animals. Interact with the rare species being cared for, including the serval, a type of wild cat.

Day 4

Gaze at the lush subtropical foliage of the Blyde River Canyon, the world's largest green canyon, as we drive along the Panorama Route. Wander through mist-covered forests teeming with birdlife and pass majestic formations including the Pinnacle as well as striking lookouts such as the aptly named God's Window and Wonder View.

Day 5

Embark upon an epic full-day game drive through the heart of Kruger and encounter many of the 147 species of large mammals that roam here. Meet with staff along the way to hear about the conservation techniques they employ.

Day 6

Feed baby rhinos and witness firsthand the conservation work being done to protect these endangered creatures at an inspiring local sanctuary. Sample South Africa's famous wines during a sunset tasting session back at camp.

Day 7


Practice English with vulnerable children and orphans from the townships while volunteering with the Seeds of Light project. Read with the children and engage in arts and crafts, while learning about life in South Africa.


Day 8

Encounter the king of the jungle as we spend the day with the Global White Lion Trust conservation organization, which aims to introduce captive-bred white lions back into the wild. Learn about the project's work and spend the day in the field monitoring and collecting data on lions, as well as removing harmful alien plant species.

Days 9 + 10

Track the "Big Five" on a final game drive through a nearby park and meet with conservationists along the way. Collect the memory cards from the camera traps and present the data before saying our farewells.

Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

Adjust to life in the village of Rau, on the outskirts of Moshi, and learn about the culture of the Chagga people. We'll take a crash course in Swahili and get our tongues around a few basic phrases with the host families.

Days 3 + 4 + 5 + 6

It's time to go back to school as our volunteering begins in the classroom, where you will help teach basic English and math through educational games. In the afternoons, explore local culture by visiting an artist, watching a dance troupe perform and meeting an organization that promotes HIV/ AIDS awareness.

Day 7

Today, embark on a nature hike around

Days 9 + 10 + 11

Continue our work in the classroom and develop a more confident relationship with the schoolchildren. Afternoons and evenings will be spent learning about life in Rau village by visiting a


local orphanage, tasting the produce of a coffee farm and hearing from guest speakers about the challenges facing Africa.

Day 12

Rise early and head out on safari in Tarangire National Park, one of the top wildlife-sighting spots in Africa. Search for elephants, giraffes, buffalo, monkeys, lions and leopards before spending the night at a lodge near the park.

Days 13 + 14

Travel to Ngorongoro Crater and observe the remains of what was once Earth's tallest volcano, before its collapse two millions years ago. It is home to more than 30,000 animals. We'll return to the village and say our goodbyes before catching a flight home.

Days 1 + 2

Hit the ground running in Havana by exploring colonial plazas, the Malecon seaside boardwalk and the maze of backstreets. 

Itinerary

Days 1 + 2

We'll waste no time getting started as we explore Havana's cobbled streets, visiting the city's main sites, including Revolution Square, the Malecon seaside boardwalk and Old Havana. Sample the local cuisine before we head for Las Terrazas, a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve in the heart of the Cuban countryside.

Day 3

Get to the heart of this untouched wilderness as we soak in waterfalls and natural swimming pools hidden amid the undeveloped Cuban countryside. Visit one of Cuba's first coffee plantations and chat to artisans from the Las Terrazas eco-village. Sample coffee and vegetables sourced from the valley.

Visit one of the largest orchid gardens in Cuba and see first-hand the traditional methods employed at a local farm. A delicious lunch will be served overlooking the valley, before we stop at a nearby town and view a cliffside mural depicting the area's ancient past.

Day 5

Relax for an entire day on the paradise island of Cayo Levisa, where, after a 45-minute boat ride from the mainland, we'll be surrounded by white sand, sapphire waters and swaying palms. Rent a snorkel to witness life beneath the waves or simply unwind on the beach, before we return to Viñales for


dinner and a night out Cuban-style.

Day 6

Trek through the Viñales Valley, whose blossoming landscape of coffee, to-bacco, sugar-cane and banana plantations supports a population of about 25,000. Meet with farmers along the way and see the meandering river that flows into the ancient Cueva del Indio cave. A private botanical garden tour follows before we cap off our time in the west of Cuba with a final dinner.

Day 7 + 8

Take the chance to absorb Havana's infectious energy, listening to the sounds of salsa that echo through its alleyways. After a last-minute shopping session at a craft market, we'll enjoy a cocktail-making class and dinner before bidding our farewells.

Days 1 + 2

Jazz and salsa beats will immediately hit your ears upon arriving in Havana. There will be no time to waste as we set about exploring the maze of backstreets, plazas and seaside promenades that form this historic city. We'll visit a world-renowned Cuban dance troupe and wander through a neighborhood transformed by Cuban artist Jose Fuster. There'll also be a chance to visit the Fine Arts Museum of Havana and explore the community-based arts organization Muraleando.

Day 3

Sample one of Cuba's most famous exports at the Havana Rum Museum and continue to tingle the taste buds with a meal at an authentic family-run

paladar. An energetic evening follows with a visit to the Fabrica de Arte, an old factory transformed into a thriving culture and nightlife center.

Day 4

Head out of Havana and visit two UNESCO World Heritage Sites on the island: the colorful towns of Trinidad and Cienfuegos. Stop at the historic location of the Bay of Pigs invasion on the way to Cienfuegos, where a guide will reveal the secrets behind the town and a local artist will show us his work, before moving on to Trinidad.

Day 5

A town historian will guide us through the Spanish-style cobbled alleyways and plazas of Trinidad. Learn to salsa like a local as a Cuban instructor provides a step-by-step private lesson. Spend the evening in Plaza Mayor, which bursts to life with live music.

Day 6

On the journey back to Havana, we'll stop to see an inspirational private performance from the Cienfuegos Choir, a group dedicated to preserving the heritage of Cuban choral music. After a seaside lunch, we'll hit the road again, arriving in Havana in time for dinner.

Day 7 + 8

Day 1

After dinner at a beautiful restaurant overlooking the city, we'll explore a once-derelict factory that has been transformed into a center for Cuban arts and music.

Day 2

Find out more about Havana's thriving music and arts scenes with a presentation from a local Afro-Cuban dance troupe. Learn some basic salsa moves and gaze in awe at the pros in action. We'll wind our way through the narrow streets, square and grand cathedrals of Old Havana, as a guide accompanies us around this UNESCO World Heritage site where history oozes out of every corner. Sample mouthwatering Cuban cuisine at a family-owned paladar restaurant and spend the following hours at one of the city's jazz cafes.

Days 3 + 4

Our tour of Havana's plazas and galleries continues. We will make our way to the legendary Sloppy Joe's Bar. Recently reopened after 48 years, Sloppy Joe's served Americans during the prohibition era. The bartenders will give us a crash course in how to make their famous cocktails, including the mojito. The afternoon will focus on Cuba's art scene, with a visit to the Museum of Fine Arts and a private gallery in central Havana, where there will also be opportunity for souvenir shopping. Following a farewell dinner, we'll enjoy live music at Havana's famous Hotel Nacional. After breakfast the following morning, head back to the airport for our return flights home.
